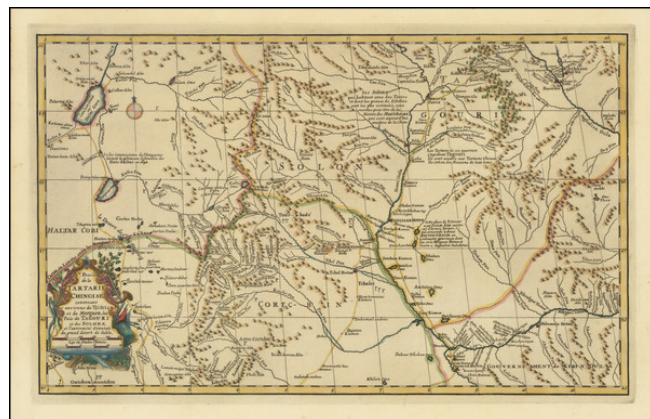

### **Description:**

Detailed map of a portion of Chinese Tartary by the French cartographer Jean Baptiste Bourguignon d'Anville.

One of the most interesting aspects of the map is its depiction of the Tciticicar, Merguen and Tagouri regions, which were little-known and poorly understood by Europeans at the time. The map shows these regions as being located in the eastern part of Chinese Tartary, near the border with Siberia. The Tciticicar region is shown as being a relatively small area, bounded by the Erg un-Kerrein Mountains to the north and the Desert of Gobi to the south. The Merguen region is depicted as being slightly larger, and is located to the north of the Tciticicar region. Finally, the Tagouri region is shown as being the largest of the three, and is located to the east of the eerguen region, near the border with Siberia.

In addition to its geographical information, the map also includes a wealth of cultural and political information about the region. For example, the map shows the locations of roads, various cities and towns, and the names of various tribes and ethnic groups that lived in the region.
