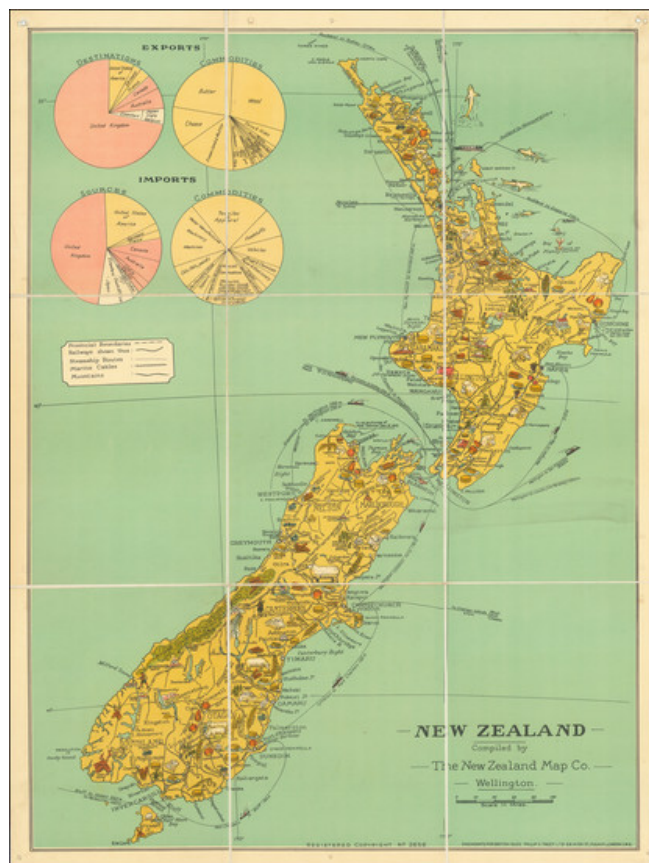

***Thematic Map Published In Wellington***

Rare separately published map of New Zealand, highlighting New Zealand's agriculture and industry.
