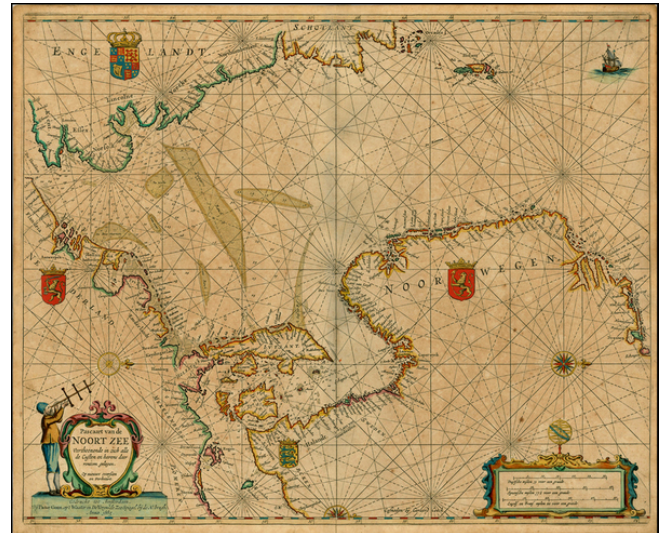

Description:

Striking full color, gold heighten example of Goos' map of the Noort Zee, extending from the Mouth of the Thames and the English Channel and Calais and Dunkirk to Stetin and Christianopolen on the Baltic and Dronten and Schogen in Norway.

Includes 3 compass roses and the coat of arms of the four major contiguous nations., along with a sailing ship and two cartouches.

Pieter Goos (1616-1675) was a Dutch map and chart maker, whose father Abraham Goos (approx. 1590-1643) had already published numerous globes, land and sea maps together with Jodocus Hondius and Johannes Janssonius in Antwerp. Pieter Goos came to prominence in the publication of Sea Charts after he bought the copperplates of the famous guide book for sailors '*De Lichtende Columne ofte Zeespiegel*' (Amsterdam 1644, 1649, 1650) from Anthonie Jacobsz. Goos published his own editions of this work in various languages, while adding his own maps. In 1666, he published his '*De Zee-Atlas ofte Water-Weereld*', which is considered one of the best sea atlases of its time. Goos' sea charts came to dominate the Dutch market for Sea Charts until the 1680s, when the Van Keulen family began to come to prominence.
