

A Foundational American Map—Pike's Map of the Trans-Mississippi West—Rare Dutch Edition!

An exceptional map showing the eastern portion of Zebulon Pike's explorations of the American Southwest. This was the first map to show the area in such detail based on first-hand observations. This is a rare version of the map from the Dutch edition of Pike's popular account.

The map shows Pike's route through the region from the Mississippi north to the Missouri River and then west, eventually crossing south to the Arkansas River. It shows what today is Missouri, Eastern Kansas, Eastern Nebraska, Eastern Oklahoma and North Texas. Pike would continue west and then be captured and taken to Mexico, as shown on the western half of the map.

The detail between the Missouri River, Kansas River and the Red River is original and influential; it includes many original notes and observations which make it a source map for all maps which came after it. Wheat calls these this map and its partner "milestones in the mapping of the American West."

The map was prepared to illustrate the first edition of *An Account of Expeditions to the Sources of the Mississippi, and Through the Western Parts of Louisiana, to the Sources of the Arkansaw, Kans, La Platte,*



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and Pierre Jaun, Rivers; ... During the Years 1805, 1806, and 1807. And a Tour Through the Interior Parts of New Spain, When Conducted Through These Provinces, by order of The Captain-General, in the year 1807, published in 1810. Dutch, German, and French editions quickly followed.
