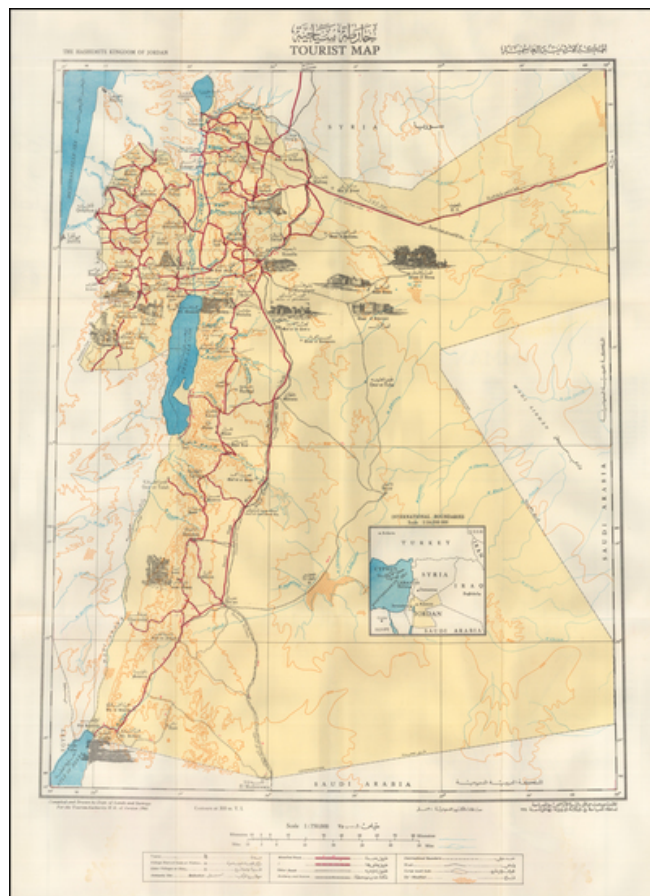

**Tourist Map -- The Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan**

Long before Jordan officially recognized the State of Israel, no where is Israel written on the map. This is also before the 1967 Six-Day War, at the conclusion of which Jordan had lost control of the West Bank (and Egypt temporarily lost the Sinai Peninsula).

There is no mention of Israel; the boundaries reflect the region prior to the Six Day War, with an "Armistice Line" surrounding the Jordanian Holy Land. However, the reality of the situation is addressed on the rear of the card folder in a paragraph stating:

*Travel between Jordan and Israel: Only a one way crossing between Jordan and Israel is permitted. Visitors coming to Jordan via Israel will be allowed entry provided there is no valid Israeli visa affixed to their passports and provided they submit a certificate of church membership....*

A key at the bottom of the map provides symbols for Towns, Villages, Antiquity Sites, International Boundaries, Railways, Wadi Beds etc.
