

Detailed chart of a portion of the southern tip of Tierra del Fuego, with contemporary annotations showing use at sea in 1875. Includes nearly 20 profile views.

The chart illustrates both the advanced understanding of the principal passages through the region and the extent to which large parts of the coastlines were still largely unsurveyed. This is most true in Hoste Island, but a close inspection of the map reveals that many of the coastlines shown are partially shown in broken lines without a definied coastline, reflecting regions still not known well.

The present chart is based upon surveys on the coast of South America aboard the H.M.S. *Beagle* in 1836, during its second voyage.

The second voyage of *HMS Beagle* is notable for carrying the recently graduated naturalist Charles Darwin around the world. While the survey work was carried out, Darwin travelled and researched geology, natural history and ethnology onshore. He gained fame by publishing his diary journal, best known as *The Voyage of the Beagle*, and his findings played a pivotal role in the formation of his scientific theories on evolution and natural selection.
