Double-crested Cormorant

The Double-crested Cormorant (*Phalacrocorax auritus*) is a waterfowl native to North America, distinguishable by its slender profile, long neck, and a notably hooked bill. Its name is derived from the tufts of feathers that appear above each eye during the breeding season. Preferring freshwater and coastal habitats, these birds are adept divers, plunging into water to catch fish, which constitute their primary diet. While underwater, they propel themselves with their webbed feet, emerging often with a catch in

their bill. Historically, the population of the Double-crested Cormorant faced significant decline due to pesticide exposure, notably DDT. However, with subsequent bans on harmful pesticides and conservation efforts, their numbers have rebounded in recent decades. Nonetheless, their increasing population has led to concerns among fishery managers about the potential impact on fish stocks.
