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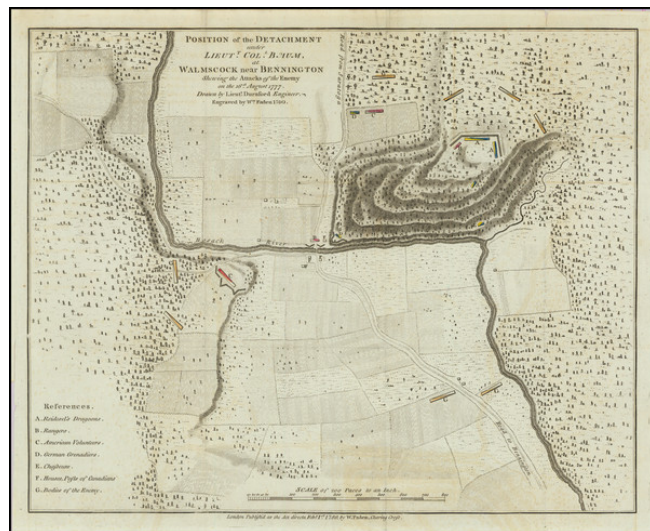

Description:

Finely executed battle plan, illustrating the action around Bennington, Vermont in August 1777.

The plan appeared in General John Burgoyne's *State of the Expedition from Canada*, a defense against charges that Burgoyne mismanaged the British expedition from Canada which he commanded in the Summer-Fall of 1777. The map was drawn by Lieutenant Colonel Friedrich Baum, a German officer present on the scene, then engraved and printed by the Faden firm in London.

Battle of Bennington

The Battle of Bennington was part of the Saratoga campaign. The battle site was in Walloomsac, New York, about 10 miles west of Bennington, Vermont. The Americans forces, which consisted of New Hampshire, Vermont and Massachusetts militiamen, led by General John Stark and Colonel Seth Warner and members of the Green Mountain Boys, which decisively defeated the British forces led by Lieutenant Colonel Friedrich Baum.
